In the dead of winter, when fleeing domestic violence, or when a job ends abruptly — that's when people are most vulnerable.

Crossroads provides five emergency shelters, tailored to the diverse needs of individuals and families — and aimed at helping them transition to long-term housing and stability.


Housing
