ABOUT LOTUS HOUSE

Lotus House is the largest women's homeless shelter in the country, sheltering over 525 nightly and 1,450+ women, youth and children annually. So much more than shelter, Lotus House provides a life changing sanctuary, deep therapeutic and supportive services, and evidence based best practices that help women, youth and children heal, learn, grow and thrive on every level. We aim to provide holistic, wrap around, and trauma-informed supportive services, including:

- Child and family assessments and therapeutic services
- Medical and mental health linkages and resources
- Educational supports for all ages
- Holistic programming and enrichment activities
- Individual adult counseling and support groups
- Resource coordination for social services and benefits
- Employment assistance and job readiness training
- Housing and move-out assistance

Lotus House is setting the standard at a national level for best practices and innovation. A model in which community and collaboration are embedded in everything we do, recognizing that the solutions to homelessness are found in deep collaborations that bring critical services and resources to those we serve who are among the most vulnerable in our community.



Our newest innovation project on the Lotus Village campus is the Children's Village. We celebrated its grand opening in November of this year. Thanks to unprecedented community collaboration and the hard work of our extraordinary, pro bono, Dream Team, the Children's Village is a dream come true. This innovative neighborhood children's education and resource center provides a rich array of programming, therapeutic supports, resources and services for the children and families of Lotus House and our Overtown community and surrounds.

In collaboration with more than twelve other nonprofits, the Children's Village provides barrier-free access to education, healthcare, therapeutic supports, legal aid, arts programs, STEM, and a wide range of resources designed to invest in and strengthen children and families. Utilizing an innovative collective impact model for collaboration by and amongst Lotus House and many other nonprofits, the Children's Village is truly a "village" because it takes a village to raise a child, a centuries old proverb that still rings true today. In the Children's Village we are setting a new model for the nation, building shared community, and creating pathways for our children and youth to heal, thrive and shine. As an added benefit, we are aiming to provide deeper post exit stabilization for families who have exited Lotus House and critical resources and services to those in our neighborhood to both end and prevent homelessness.

Children's Village will serve an estimated 2,500+ children, youth and families each year for generations to come thanks to your support. Together, we break cycles of poverty and homelessness, helping build safer, brighter futures for the children and families in our community.



IMPACT MODEL AT CHILDREN'S VILLAGE

Children's Village expands the capacity of Lotus House and other providers serving Overtown to address the needs of children, youth and families. It functions as a powerful homelessness prevention initiative and model neighborhood education and resource center by co-locating multiple nonprofit organizations under one roof to deliver coordinated, wraparound services.

For at-risk children and families, access to high-quality, diverse programming, social services, and enriched resources must be embedded in the communities that need them most. Research shows such programs not only strengthen neighborhood well-being but also reduce behavioral issues in children and boost school readiness and success. These efforts strengthen the entire community's sustainability.

Being located in the heart of Overtown, this scalable model deepens Lotus House's mission to end and prevent homelessness and offers a national blueprint that heals, strengthens and uplifts children, youth, and families in need.

































CENTER FOR THE ADVANCEMENT OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

We are excited to announce the opening of Lotus House's Center for the Advancement of Children and Families in and anchoring the Children's Village at Lotus Village. The new Center builds upon and expands Lotus House's signature therapeutic program for high special needs sheltered children and families, bringing these vital therapeutic services to the children, youth and families of our Overtown community and surrounds. Lotus House has been on the forefront of research nationally into the needs of children, youth and families impacted by trauma and tailoring evidence-based therapies and assessments to heal and strengthen children, youth and families impacted by trauma to help them build safer, brighter futures. We are aiming to break cycles of violence, abuse and homelessness rooted in unhealed trauma, so that children and families heal, thrive and stay together.

Evidence-based assessments guide prevention and early intervention efforts, helping us evaluate child development, parent-child interaction, trauma symptoms, behavioral and mental health, as well as parental stress, attitudes, and trauma history. Prevention services, such as Triple P Parenting classes, offer mothers the opportunity to learn and gain support from both facilitators and peers. These interventions aim to strengthen parental sensitivity, reduce stress, and improve both child and parent mental health. By thoroughly assessing families' needs, we can deepen our understanding of the unique challenges faced by children impacted by trauma, poverty, and homelessness.

Intervention services address identified needs through trauma-informed therapies including:

- Video Feedback Intervention for Positive Parenting-Sensitive Discipline (VIPP-SD)
- Perinatal Child-Parent Psychotherapy (P-CPP)
- Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT)

- Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT)
- Child-Parent Psychotherapy (CPP)
- Family Check-Up/Everyday Parenting (FCU/EP)

Lotus House's Children's Services program has been proud to lead service driven research nationally to help raise awareness on the special needs of sheltered women and children, with a focus on those disproportionately impacted by violence and further marginalized by homelessness.

In 2025, Lotus House was honored to receive two prestigious awards from The Children's Trust:

- The Champions for Children Lifetime Achievement Award was given to Constance Collins, President and Founder of Lotus House, in recognition of her enduring commitment to improving the lives of women, youth, and children experiencing homelessness in Miami-Dade County.
- Program of the Year was awarded to the Children's Services Parenting Program at Lotus House, celebrating its impactful work in supporting unhoused families and children with evidencebased parenting and therapeutic services.

We are also excited to share that Lotus House's Children's Services team was invited to present the results of our service driven research at the 5th World Conference of Women's Shelters in Sydney, Australia in September. Their presentation, "Understanding and Addressing the Mental Health Needs of Sheltered Children and Mothers: Results of a 5-Year Community-Based, Service-Driven Research Project," shared key insights with an international audience.





Lotus House Children's Services team will be expanding its important work in the new Center for Advancement of Children and Families at the Children's Village as it enters the seventh year of its service driven research into the special needs of children experiencing homelessness and effective therapeutic interventions to address the impacts of adverse childhood experiences. This research aims to and does save and change lives.

EDUCATION & EMPLOYMENT

Education, employment and access to enriched resources are the foundation on which brighter futures are built for the women, youth and children we serve and at the heart of everything we do. Lotus House programs are essential to empowering those we serve and equipping them with the tools they need to achieve their educational and employment goals on their pathway to a future that ends homelessness.

Our Education and Employment program is designed to provide all ages with access to educational resources, job readiness training and employment assistance, and supportive services to promote success in each respective area. Providing a range of services and resources, women, youth and children are supported throughout their stay at Lotus House to empower them to achieve their goals. Our services include:



Basic educational supplies, school enrollment assistance, homework help, and tutoring

College counseling, application and enrollment assistance

Workforce development and job readiness programs

English and Spanish literacy classes, Adult Basic Education (ABE) and GED

Resume writing workshops, financial literacy supports and mock interviews

On site paid internships in culinary, hospitality, retail and farming

The David and Leila Centner Culinary Center, Lotus House Thrift Chic Boutique, The Farm at Lotus Village and The Lotus House Hospitality Program welcome over 200 interns a year.

Further supporting our employment program, among our proudest numbers are those that reflect the impact and successes of our Lotus House Alumnae. **Nearly 40% of our Lotus House team are alumnae of the program,** across multiple departments and at all levels, including director, managerial and supervisory roles.

HEALING ARTS

The arts are foundational to giving voice to those who have survived by being invisible. For some, art provides alternative pathways to healing. For others, it is the discovery of their creative voice and building a shared community. In all its many forms, art has always been integral to the Lotus House program experience, offering new ways of expressing thoughts and emotions to successfully support healing and moving forward.

The programming spaces at Lotus House are activated thanks to volunteers who generously donate their time, skills, and energy to support our mission. From painting, ceramics, dance, yoga, jujitsu, meditation, salon activities, monthly birthday parties, and so many holiday celebrations, our programming team is able to provide enriched programming, a space for artistic expression and healing, and a vibrant and engaging community for Lotus House guests.



HEALTH AND WELLNESS

Women, youth and children experiencing homelessness often arrive at Lotus House with little to no access to healthcare, having faced systemic barriers such as lack of insurance, high out-of-pocket costs, language and cultural obstacles, transportation challenges, and difficulty navigating a complex and fragmented health system. For many, hospital emergency rooms are their primary and only access to health care, with little to no opportunity for preventive or ongoing treatment. The Lotus House team serves as a health care resource hub, making vital linkages to community providers and providing needed assistance to overcome barriers to health and wellness by:



Coordinating medical, mental health, and developmental assessments

Facilitating access to essential medications and medical equipment

Assisting with co-pays as funding is available

Providing health care navigation, advocacy, linkages, and follow-ups

Transportation to and from appointments

Coordinating dental and vision services

A multi-faceted, coordinated approach to health and wellness helps build long-term healthcare connections and a medical home, moving our guests from crisis-driven care to stable, community-based health systems.



BUILDING STABLE FUTURES

Our person centered program, allows us to support post exit stabilization in a manner that is appropriate and best suited for the women, youth and children of Lotus House. Person centered action plans are created shortly after arriving to Lotus House, outlining goals for their eventual successful exit from the shelter system. These goals are supported and further refined throughout their stays, working with Resource Coordinators, Counselors and other program team members to support progress towards meeting these goals, culminating at exit.

Our work, however, does not stop at exit. Furnishing a home, ensuring that health homes are in place for uninterrupted care, budgeting, legal linkages and essential resources and supplies at our monthly giveaways! We look forward to expanding these services at Children's Village.

LOTUS HOUSE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Since inception, Lotus House has strived to invest in, support and uplift our Overtown community and surrounds with resources, events and activities for our neighbors, ranging from holiday celebrations to health fairs and toy give-aways. During and in the wake of the pandemic, it became clearer than ever that our neighbors were struggling with food insecurity, lack of access to health care, and a general lack of resources in so many ways. The challenges continue to this day. We have responded with monthly distribution events that provide low- and nobarrier access to essential services and resources, meals, education and other basic needs through our Lotus House in the Neighborhood Program, spearheaded by our Community Outreach team and countless volunteers. Thanks to our generous donors and in collaboration with healthcare providers and other vital community organizations, Lotus House monthly distributions serve over 700 needy individuals and families, offering:

Prepared meals and groceries

Hygiene products and clothing supplies

Book bags and school supplies

Toys during holiday distributions

Health screenings and wellness exams, ultrasounds and diagnostic testing

Health education on a range of topics

Since inception, Lotus House has distributed over 193,000+ pounds of food thanks to the generosity of our donors, community partners and volunteers.

We are excited that the Children's Village will allow us to expand on the support and services Lotus House offers to our community with the inclusion of: an all new food pantry filled with essential items such as non-perishable food; a clothing closet with both basic clothing and business attire; and thrift and retail job training programs offering youth hands-on training in retail and operations.





THE NATIONAL WOMEN'S SHELTER NETWORK

Three and a half years ago, Lotus House began an initiative to establish the National Women's Shelter Network, Inc. (NWSN), a national network of women's and family shelters and safe haven programs committed to ending and preventing homelessness. Today, we are proud to say that the network includes over 470+ women and family shelters and safe haven programs providing 45,000+ shelter bed nights nightly and whose collective impact annually provides:

900k+ women, children and families sheltered

16+ million shelter bed nights

26+ million free meals

640k+ counseling sessions

In the NWSN, Lotus House continues to lead the way in research, best practices, and innovation on a national level, to elevate trauma-informed care and best practices for women, children and families all across our nation.

Highlights of the NWSN's accomplishments this year include:

2025 National Conference, Shelters United for Women,

Children and Families: The NWSN hosted their second, successful national conference in Washington D.C., including over 330 attendees representing 260 shelter and safe haven programs and coalitions, national partners and allies from 35 states. Participants joined together in solidarity to learn, share, and shine a light on the urgent needs of women, youth, children, families, and seniors experiencing homelessness. This year's convening featured over 50 panel presentations and breakout sessions, 100+ inspiring speakers, and powerful conversations on Capitol Hill.

Capitol Hill Day: An unforgettable and uniting experience, the NWSN's Capitol Hill Day gave shelter leaders the tools and opportunity to educate their Federal lawmakers on the special needs of those experiencing homelessness in their communities, the importance of safe, supportive shelter for



women, children and families in transition, and the need for more resources to support successful transitions to end homelessness. In total, there were 70 meetings across the House and Senate, over 100 participants — a stellar showing — and significant progress was made in elevating the crisis of women's and family homelessness. And our work continues.





Women's and Family Protection Act: The bipartisan Women's and Family Protection Act (WFPA) was officially introduced in Congress by Republican Congressman Carlos Gimenez of Florida and Democratic Congressman Ritchie Torres of New York on May 9, 2025! An impressive number of influential national and stateside organizations joined the NWSN in endorsing this first step toward securing both awareness and additional funding for women's and family shelters and safe haven programs across the country. This incredible milestone lifts up the importance of safe shelter in saving lives in the halls of Congress for the first time in more than a decade.

National Public Awareness Campaign: This past April, the NWSN launched a multi-media, national public awareness campaign, Safe Shelter Saves Lives, to shine a spotlight on the critical issue of homelessness—particularly for vulnerable women, children and families. This important campaign amplifies the voices of women with lived experience, challenges stereotypes, and raises awareness of the importance of safe shelter in saving and changing lives.



More than a network, the NWSN is a movement to advance the safety, economic security, health and wellbeing of women, youth, children, families and our seniors experiencing homelessness and the shelters and safe havens that serve them in communities all across the country. Shelters and safe haven programs all across the country are the last and final safety net for millions of women and children in transition, the majority of whom are victims of violence. With enriched supportive services and resources, the NWSN and its members transform the trauma of homelessness into windows of opportunity for women and children to build safer, brighter futures. Both were remarkable women whose tireless efforts have left a lasting legacy of compassion, empowerment, and support for the women and children of Lotus House. Their work—spanning decades of advocacy, education, and community development—continues to inspire our team, proving that dedicated leadership and a commitment to justice can transform lives and build stronger, more equitable communities.

RAI JOHNSON

An alumna of Lotus House, Rai Johnson joined the Lotus House team in 2008 as a Health Coordinator and served as our Director of Wellness until she retired this past year. Having earned her Bachelors of Science with a concentration in Behavioral Health Sciences and Social Work and her Masters in Social Work from Barry University, she dedicated over 20 years to the field of Addictions Counseling. She was driven by a mission and desire to help individuals struggling with behavioral health and addiction issues find healing and hope.

She spent years at Lotus House working with individuals and families experiencing homelessness, substance abuse and mental health issues, developing and implementing holistic programming to help them heal and blossom into who they were meant to be. Countless women and children can say that Rai was an integral part of their healing journey. Hers is a legacy of life and love.

DONNA MACDONALD

Donna MacDonald first joined Lotus House as a grant writer in 2006 and became our Program Development Director, responsible for overseeing program research and development and grant writing in 2012. Donna's impact in our community goes well beyond Lotus House and deeply rooted in a lifelong commitment to social equity and public health. With a Master's Degree in Health Science from the University of Toronto, specializing in behavioral health and nutrition, and a Bachelor's degree from Ryerson University, she leveraged her academic foundation to drive meaningful change across many sectors.

Over the past 30 years, Donna worked with numerous organizations across Canada and the U.S., shaping and leading programs in health, human services, education, housing, and community development. Whether through grant writing, program evaluation, or frontline service, Donna's work consistently empowered vulnerable populations, making her a driving force in the fight against poverty and systemic disadvantage. She leaves behind a legacy of life and love.





In 2007, immediately following the opening of Lotus House, Lotus Endowment Fund, Inc., a 501c3 tax exempt charitable foundation, was organized to support Lotus House and other initiatives of the Sundari Foundation, Inc. to prevent and end homelessness. We share the vision of Lotus House that every woman, youth and child experiencing homelessness will have the opportunity to heal, learn, grow and blossom into who they are truly meant to be. We support their important mission by providing the resources needed for the acquisition and development of their state of the art comprehensive shelter facilities in Lotus Village, the newly completed neighborhood children's education, therapeutic and resource center in the Children's Village at Lotus Village, and the growing Lotus Village campus, designed to end and prevent homelessness. 


